<ul> <li>Clothes</li> <li>After completing, students will be able to identify and describe various garments.</li> <li>To introduce students to traditional Xhosa clothing and its cultural significance.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>At the end of the lesson students should be able to:</li> <li>identify and describe various garments.</li> <li>understand and appreciate the role of clothing in Xhosa culture.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>STEP 1:</li> <li>Teacher shows pictures of traditional Xhosa attire and discuss the significance of clothing in Xhosa culture.</li> <li>Introduce key Xhosa words related to clothing, such as "isikhakha" (headwrap), "isidwaba" (apron), "iqhiya" (hat), "isigege" (shawl), and "isikoti" (dress).</li> <li>STEP 2:</li> <li>Discuss the importance of clothing in expressing cultural identity.</li> <li>Use the online whiteboard or flip chart to write down examples of sentences using the clothing vocabulary</li> <li>CONCLUSION:</li> <li>Briefly summarize the key vocabulary and</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Reading</li> <li>Discussion</li> <li>Writing</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Textbook</li> <li>Pictures</li> <li>Videos</li> <li>Xhosa-English vocabulary list of clothing items</li> </ul>

5	Weather and Seasons <ul> <li>students will learn how to describe the weather using all three tenses</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>At the end of the lesson students should be able to:</li> <li>describe what happens in nature during the various seasons</li> <li>describe the weather using all three tenses</li> <li>happens in nature during each season.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>STEP 1:</li> <li>Greet the learners in Xhosa and briefly review any previously learned Xhosa greetings.</li> <li>Introduce the topic of the lesson and its relevance to everyday communication.</li> <li>STEP 2:</li> <li>Present the Xhosa weather and seasons vocabulary list and discuss the importance of understanding and using these terms in Xhosa STEP 3:</li> <li>Engage learners in a group activity where they match the Xhosa weather and season terms with pictures or illustrations</li> <li>Use flashcards to help learners memorize and practice using Xhosa weather and season terms <b>CONCLUSION</b>:</li> <li>Encourage learners to practice using the newly acquired vocabulary in context, for example, by describing the current weather or their favorite season in Xhosa</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Break down the words</li> <li>Conduct repetition exercises for pronunciation</li> <li>worksheets for sentence construction</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Xhosa weather and seasons vocabulary list</li> <li>Flashcards containing Xhosa weather and season terms</li> <li>Pictures or illustrations</li> </ul>
